We shouldn't have to hope for more crime to fund essential services

It's time to provide stable revenues for public services and end Delaware's dependence on unreliable fines and fees

Court fees aren't about accountability.

They are hidden taxes, surcharges added to violations that are used to fund government services. They disproportionately impact low-income Delawareans and communities of color – and when added to minor infractions, they make **small mistakes** into **big deals**.

Example: Forgetting your EZ Pass

Toll Due: \$0.50

Administrative Fee: \$25.00 Ambulance Co. Fee: \$10.00

Fund to Combat Violent Crimes: \$15.00


Total w/ fees: \$50.50 (>100x increase!)

Delaware collects far more in fees than it does in fines. As of November 2023, Delaware Courts reported the following outstanding debt from criminal cases for defendants:

Fines: \$9,770,815 **Fees:** \$19,215,619 Total: \$29,986,434 Fees fund vital services – DE residents depend on violations to fund government

Today, Delaware depends on fees - but it hasn't always been this way:

- + Fee for bailiffs and other court security
- + Fee for DELJIS, central system for criminal and driving records
- + Fee for overtime and weaponry for state and local police
- + Fee for firefighter and ambulance services



This system is inefficient...

- Where fees have been closely studied in other jurisdictions, they actually cost more money to collect than they take in
- As crime has gotten lower the past few years in Delaware, vital services have had their funding destabilized

...and cruel.

- 85% of defendants in Delaware courts are "indigent," and thus already struggling financially
- 56% of warrants for unpaid fines and fees in 2017 were to Black defendants; fees disproportionately impact Black communities
- Being unable to pay fees can ruin your credit, keep you from renewing a driver's license, and prevent you from getting an expungement – making keeping your job or finding housing impossible

Let's change it.
